SERVICE-RELATED SUPPORT

Defence Children Services (formally Directorate Children and Young People DCYP) provides a single Ministry of Defence (MOD) focus for all issues related to service children and young people and the children of MOD UK based personnel and MOD sponsored organisations stationed overseas where they provide education at 22 schools and settings.

DCS also directly supports Service families, providing advice on a wide range of educational matters both overseas and in the UK, delivered by specialist education and advisory teams.

The Education Advisory Team (EAT) (UK) is part of DCS. It provides professional information, advice and guidance regarding the education of Service Children in the UK. EAT also provides advice and guidance for service personnel and eligible MOD civilians regarding education and education-related issues, such as retention of Service Family Accommodation, the Continuity of Education Allowance & the Special Educational Needs Addition, Special Educational Needs and School Admissions.

Term Time Absence Advice has been produced by the MOD to provide advice to Head Teachers, when making decisions on term time absence applications from service families and explains how head teachers can seek further guidance from the MOD when dealing with specific cases.

Service Pupil Premium (SPP) The Department for Education introduced the Service Pupil Premium in April 2011 in recognition of the specific challenges children from service families face and as part of the commitment to delivering the armed forces covenant.

State schools, academies and free schools in England, which have children of service families in school years Reception to Year 11, can receive the SPP funding. It is designed to assist the school in providing the additional support that these children may need and is currently worth £310 per service child who meets the eligibility criteria:

- one parent is serving in the regular armed forces (including pupils with a parent who is on full commitment as part of the full-time reserve)
- they have been registered as a 'service child' on the January school census at any point since 2016
- death of a parent whilst serving in the armed forces and the pupil receives a pension under the Armed Forces Compensation Scheme or the War Pensions Scheme

Children have to be flagged as service children ahead of the autumn school census deadline. Service parents need to make the school aware of their status by talking to the head teacher or school admin staff.

ROYAL NAVY SUPPORT

Royal Navy Family & People Support (RN FPS) delivers a range of services to support both service personnel and their families. These offer both proactive, reactive and crisis intervention.

Information support is available, as and when required, and is useful for when relocating, deploying, looking for a specific service, or if you have a question or issue that you cannot find the answer to. Through regular research RN FPS Information Officers ensure up to date and relevant information is available to all. Information is available via the RN Website, RN Forum, and internal channels such as DEFNet and Sharepoint or directly via email.

Community support is offered in a variety of different settings including centres and houses close to Royal Navy Units, with many of the local activities being carried out in partnership with other organisations, such as Aggie's. In response to a specific requirement, events will be organised in the appropriate geographical area. Events can also be hosted online via MS Teams to enable a greater reach out to families in dispersed areas.

The Royal Navy Youth Network supports young people and feeds into the Tri-Service Youth Forum allowing individuals to share their experiences, influence policy and gain professional and peer-to-peer support.

Official engagement with our personnel and families is key to ensure they are gaining the correct information at the right time. The Royal Navy Forum provides a safe and secure area of communication for families to be informed, involved and intouch with the Royal Navy. Some areas are open access, however specific messaging and information for families is within a gated area accessed through registering as a member, especially important for messaging that should not be added to third party social media and for time when we are silent on these too. RN FPS also manage the official Social Media presence for the Royal Navy community where closed Facebook groups are used as a conduit into the RN Website and RN Forum. Both are moderated from 0800-2200, 365 days per year. https://forum.royalnavy.mod.uk

Deployment support is a key area of our work in which information, community and engagement play a part. Working closely with Units prior to deployment we carry out planning meetings which includes organising unit Forum Liaison Officers (FLOs) mandatory pre-deployment briefs to personnel and meetings with DO/TCs where certain issues can be discussed with a Case Worker. Some units now deploy with a Case Worker as part of their Ship's company allowing for immediate specialist advice and support to both the Divisional System and individuals. Families can also take advantage of RN FPS online briefs, information packs, memory box activity packs for children and Family Welfare Grant (FWG) Days Out, all of which are available via the RN Forum.

Compassionate support

Whilst the above sits more in the proactive space RN FPS are also reactive in times of need, both in engagement and specialist welfare support. There are times when individuals may require a more specialist service to support during a crisis or personal situation. Our professionally trained Case Work staff offer guidance; support either practical or emotional; and will advocate on your behalf directly or in conjunction with other agencies. Wherever you are living and/or based, the primary access point for these services is the RN FPS Portal. A comprehensive assessment of the situation will be carried out to ascertain what support is required, and this may be provided immediately, through signposting to the right sources of support or through the allocation of a RN FPS Case Worker who will stay by your side until their presence is no longer required.





Aggie's supports all personnel serving in the Royal Navy, Royal Marines, Royal Fleet Auxiliary and their families with pastoral and practical support.

Aggie's has Pastoral Workers based in RN establishments and RM units across the UK and has a dedicated Pastoral Worker, based at Whale Island, for those serving in the RFA. Aggie's pastoral workers are available to listen, chat, offer comfort and support and signpost all serving personnel and their families as they require.

Aggie's Pastoral Workers work in close collaboration with the chaplains and are often located within NCS Havens and coffee bars, which offer a relaxed environment for personnel.

The Community Waves teams in Portsmouth and Plymouth offer families a timetable of events based in and around SFA areas. Events range from fitness and walking groups to sewing, craft and coffee and toddler groups. The timetable of all events can be found on Aggie's social media.

Aggie's Storybook Waves is a FREE service that enables all personnel serving in the Royal Navy to record a bedtime story for their children to listen to whilst they are separated. Separation can be through deployment, non-operational separation, courses and long shift patterns. After the story is recorded, sound effects are added and then sent to the family with the Aggie's gift pack that includes; a copy of the book read, copy of the NCC's Zoe and the Time Rabbit, Aggie's Mini Medals for each child, bookmarks and aged appropriate deployment journals.

PRE-SCHOOL & NURSERY

Sodexo MOD Childcare Voucher Scheme has now CLOSED to new entrants, the guidelines state to be eligible to be a member of the scheme you should have had a voucher deduction before the deadline, therefore the last date to join the MOD scheme was 31st August 2018.

The new Government scheme called **Tax Free Childcare**, supports working parents with childcare costs. Childcare vouchers can be used to pay any Ofsted (or equivalent) registered childcare providers, which can include nurseries, childminders, nannies, play schemes, out-of-hours school clubs and holiday camps, as well as certain elements of independent school fees.

Tax Free Childcare with TFC parents have an online account, the account will be topped up by the Government with £2.00 for every £8.00 contribution from the parents, up to a maximum of £2000 per child per year. Further information is available at the Government TFC website

The Wraparound Childcare (WAC) was originally piloted in 3 locations between 2020 and 2022 with the aim to offer free childcare for service families, covering before and after-school care during term time, for children aged 4 to 11, easing the burden for service parents.

From Autumn 2022 WAC was rolled out across the UK. WAC funding will now be available to all eligible Service families with children aged 4 to 11 years, who are in school or being home schooled in the UK.

If eligible, Personnel can claim up to 20 hours per week of funding for each child that is attending before and after school care during term time. WAC is known as 'Out of School care' in Wales and 'School Aged Childcare' in Scotland.

SCHOOLS

Applying for a School Place applications for preferred schools require proof of permanent address, however there are measures in place under the Schools Admissions Code to allow Service families to use the unit address as listed on the assignment order or, if appropriate, a quartering address of the closest Service Families Accommodation where they have been allocated accommodation. The Unit Personnel Office/HR Department may be able to provide a letter confirming posting to the area to support the application.
